- 1. Read ______ and honestly (this is a mark of wisdom-8:13)
- 2. Confess our _____ of folly
- 3. Gaze upon the ______ of our Christ and the salvation that is ours in Him by faith
- 4. With a heart filled with ______, ask for the Spirit's help to walk in obedience to this law

BONUS- Thoughts about fighting for the Truth without falling into error ourselves

-excerpts from chapter 1 of "History of English Calvinistic Baptists" entitled "The Legacy of John Gill" (1697-1771)

In a time of doctrinal decline John Gill valiantly defended the doctrine of God's sovereign election. However, in his zeal to defend this truth he went too far and began to promote an error on the other side known as hyper-Calvinism

Previous reformed Baptist ministers (such as Benjamin Keach) taught in the universal offer of the gospel to all and that all men have a responsibility to repent and believe.

Gill, however, in an effort to fight the Arminianism of his day began to emphasize the eternal decrees of God in such a way that everything was pushed back to them. So, justification did not happen in time for a sinner but was decreed in eternity (essentially making the covenant of Redemption and the Covenant of grace one). Therefore, sinners did not have responsibility to repent. In a desire to defend truth he went too far.
